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2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Yes, Students Mentoring system is available in all constituent units of the University. This system is implemented as per UGC 'Deeksharambh' for setting of universal human values. It gets the student to explore oneself and allows one to experience the joy of learning, stand up to peer pressure, take decisions with courage, be aware of relationships, be sensitive to others, understand the role of money in life, and feeling of prosperity, etc. as per UGC guidelines. Students mentoring system is designed to pair faculty and students with the motive of combining leadership and mentorship to enhance the academic performance and social responsibilities of the students. This establishes a long term relationship of the mentees with the mentors. When the students (mentees) enrolled in first year, the mentors are allotted to them. Each mentor is allotted with around 10 mentees. Every scheduled month in a specified time schedule, mentor - mentee meetings are carried out where the mentees informally discuss and interact with the mentors. Human values as care for in our constitution like justice, liberty, equality, fraternity, human dignity and the unity and integrity of the Nation can also be part of this discussion. Focus should be on inculcating values of equality and responsibility towards one's fellow citizens of any caste, class or creed. During discussion issues and requirements of SC/ST/OBC students should be assessed and addressed. Mentor-mentee relationship can help students form a bond with faculty members which can be of great help during various tough times in study courses. The interactions are documented and analyzed. Recommended discussion topics for the mentoring sessions are outlined for the mentors. The mentor takes full care of the mentees not only in academics but also on their holistic growth throughout the stay in the institution. The outcomes of the meetings are minuted and forwarded to the concerned Heads of Departments or Heads of Institutions for information and appropriate action.

#### 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1. Solar panels are used for electricity generation and for heating water in the hostels at four campuses. The installed capacity of solar power in the chennai, Karaikal and Salem campuses are is 234.2 kW. 2. The 226 kW solar power plant is connected to the grid which reduces the battery usage in the campus and also reduces the carbon emission. 3. 70 of the bulbs were replaced by LED to reduce the power demand and heating of the environment . 4. The four campuses have Sewage Treatment Plants (STP) with a total capacity of 6 lakh liters State-of-art technology used with sand /charcoal and UV filter and Effective microorganism (EM). 5. Solid waste is collected using different types of bins earmarked for plastic waste, bio waste, Sanitary napkin waste and paper waste. 6. All the campuses are banned for plastic use and declared as plastic free campuses. 7. The four campuses have more than 120 different varieties of common trees and wide variety of birds. 8. The Karaikal campus is maintaining a large water body inside the campus to make the campus eco-friendly which also maintains the ground water in a very good condition. 9. All the four campuses are regularly conducting tree plantation drives. Last year the colleges have participated in the MHRD's one student one tree campaign and more than 1700 trees were planted. 10. The Medical colleges at Salem, Puducherry and Karaikal have Bio-Medical Waste disposable Management.

#### 7.2 - Best Practices

#### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

BEST PRACTICE - 1 - MULTIDISCIPLINARY INTEGRATED TEACHING Title of the Practice: MULTIDISCIPLINARY INTEGRATED TEACHING OBJECTIVES: 1. To inculcate the advanced medical knowledge and outcome for patient care. 2. To enhance the elaborative knowledge of the topic to the students. 3. This practice is to develop a concept of proper treatment to the patient. THE CONTEXT: It helps to diagnose and to provide better treatment to patients and also improves quality of students learning. It is a motivating programme for the advanced learners to gain more knowledge. PRACTICE: Faculty from various departments together discussed about topic that are related to those disease in the community. Resource persons were selected. Evaluation of programme was done by pre and post test. Findings through evaluation helped to modify and improve the programme. Both horizontal and vertical integration have shown improved knowledge among the students and better results in the university examination. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: The learning outcomes that can be achieved by this type of practice depends on the number of disciplines involved in it and kind of knowledge that needs to be addressed. In this study delivered, students were asked to work on an assignment which allowed them to practice their skills in one unified work. An example in the assignment involved in assessment of various live and virtual cases pertaining to the disease in study and comparing them with the available results. Figures that illustrate the design case study are given to students with some hints on how and where to search for further information. Two surveys were conducted before and after each assignment to get feedback on students' satisfaction from both student cohorts. The impact of having this type of interdisciplinary work on students' learning process was identified. The following learning outcomes were achieved by integrating a computer programming methodology in a real-life mathematics problem: • Apply self-teaching: This is achieved by guiding the students to the source of information they need to investigate and understand principles. • Develop practical skills: Learn how to apply the theoretical skills on actual cases and use an appropriate therapeutic regimen. • Introduce problem-solving skills: This is achieved by analysing the assignment problem and comparing the results. · Connect academics: Improve the interaction and collaboration between the academics of different disciplines to share their thoughts on how to make the

students' learning process more exciting. PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES

REQUIRED: The co-relation of the problem with the specific discipline and available case was certainly a challenge. Certain laboratory tests and diagnostic tools are required to assess the severity of the disease and its spread. Stated SOPs could solve the problems encountered. BEST PRACTICE -2 -EVIDENCE BASED PRACTICE TITLE OF THE PRACTICE: EVIDENCE BASED PRACTICE AND RESEARCH UTILIZATION IN THE CLINICAL AREAS OBJECTIVES: • To provide evidence based data to deliver quality care based on best research • To resolve problems in clinical settings while practicing • To achieve excellence in clinical setting • To close gap between research and practice THE CONTEXT: Evidence based practice become a care requirement of contemporary nursing practice. Nursing has always used research to support the nursing practice. This is called research utilization. THE PRACTICE: The faculty and students use the five step process in their every day practice in the hospital Formulate a clinical question by identifying by identifying priority Gathering best evidence to answer the questions Select best option Implement a appropriate intervention Evaluate of practice change and outcome of intervention EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: The quality of nursing care is improved, health status of patient is improved as well as the use of evidences increased the faculty and student confidence skills, critical thinking and decision making. PROBLEM ENCOUNTERED: Sometimes in clinical settings it is difficult to find time to access research expertise that are needed to search and analyze the evidence to find answers to their clinical questions.

#### 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

Vinayaka Mission was established in 1982 and the University was setup in 2001, with the vision to achieve excellence in education as a tool for social change for the betterment of society. Over these years, the university has grown from strength to strength to make its mark in the national and global landscape. Vinayaka Mission's Research Foundation (Deemed to be University) is a model worth emulating for any knowledge hub set in a distinctive environment offering 125 programmes which includes UG, PG and PhD Programmes ranging from Engineering Technology and Arts to Medicine and Dentistry. 13 constituent colleges, and 7 schools in 4 campuses of the Deemed to be University in Salem, Puducherry, Chennai Karaikal located strategically in the rural areas provide extensive service to the people of the region in terms of educational needs, medical care and community services. Over 12,000 students from all over the country and also from other parts of the globe are studying various programmes from UG to Ph.D under the guidance of about 1,300 faculty members. Three medical college hospitals of the university have provided free medical care to 6.25 crore patients and conducted surgeries to 5.25 lakh patients over the years most of these patients are poor and from a rural background. VMRF-DU has adopted 35 villages under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan scheme. Free health care services are provided through Rural and Urban health centers including telemedicine facilities. The constituent Medical and Dental colleges of the University have conducted around 510 camps benefitting lakhs of poor and downtrodden people in various villages of Tamilnadu and Pondicherry during the current year. Around 400 Doctors and 1500 other health care professionals graduate from the Vinayaka Mission's every year and are serving to attain a healthy society. The university has adopted fisherman villages to provide basic facilities and free education to the downtrodden people. The University has contributed Rs. 3.2 Crores to the pregnant women, poor mothers, pediatrics and

geriatric poor patients under the Annapoorani Scheme in this year 2019-20. Utmost priority has been given to the research in the faculties of engineering, dentistry, medicine, pharmacy, nursing and physiotherapy on various thrust areas. The faculty members are encouraged to get more funds from the various agencies and they got 1.1 crore during this academic year.
